# Children's Literature DELI Course description 2022



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Office hours: Wednesday 13:15-14:00, Thursday 12:15-13:00
Course objectives:
The purpose of this course is to provide an overview of the history and development of English-language literature for children. It aims to establish its traditions chronologically in order to emphasize how these traditions influence and shape the later production of children's literature. Another aim is to demonstrate how literary texts from the genre of children's

literature can be adapted to teach language in EFL classes (both for children and adults).

#### Assessment based on:

- a presentation on a selected literary work; All students are asked to <u>upload the</u> <u>presentation in Moodle, final deadline: 18 Dec 2022</u>. The presentation has to be prepared in Power Point/Prezi, the minimum number of slides: 12 (it does not include the title page with your name and the title of presentation). You mustn't read your presentation, please talk to the audience. It should last for about 15-20 minutes. You can also prepare some activities, handouts, discussion questions, quizzes for your colleagues.
- **2 tests** one at mid-term and a final one at the end of the course, you have to reach at least 50% as the average of the 2 tests.
- active participation during the lessons;
- you might be given a micro-test on a selected reading assignment the literary works indicated in bold letters in the syllabus are compulsory reading assignments i.e. you have to read them for the seminar.
